THE CATS OF SUMMER

Every year late spring to early summer starts the annual “Kitten Season”. The time of year when shelters become overwhelmed with cats of all ages and will continue to be so through the end of the year. What can you do to help us reduce the number of cats in shelters or living outside?

- Adopt a shelter/rescue cat or kitten. They are all sterilized and will be microchipped to you if they become lost! Getting a free kitten will cost far more than the adoption fee you will pay.
- Adult cats are usually free or have very low adoption fees. Sure, kittens are cute, but they grow up fast. Aside from being financially friendly, you will know what their adult personality is like.
- If you will not sterilize your cat, do not let them roam outside! Intact cats are the ones that exhibit the behaviors everyone complains about. Cats should be indoor pets always, but letting your intact cat go outside contributes to unwanted litters.
- Do not feed outdoor cats! We know it is hard to deny them, but feeding outdoor cats attracts not only other cats, but also wild animals that can be dangerous to other pets and destructive to property.

Indoor cats live happy and full lives. Once let out it's almost impossible to keep them in. Letting your cat breed, especially females, can lead to costly medical issues. Get them sterilized which helps prevent problem behaviors and smells!

BERNICE KRUEGER By Jane Edgar

"I just enjoyed my whole life. I always looked forward to the next thing coming. And I enjoyed people." This is from Bernice Krueger who was born on July 18, 1922 and so, is celebrating her 100th birthday this summer. Her parents (father born in 1892 and mother in 1896) purchased their property on Daggett Avenue (now known as 53rd Street) when she was 2 years old. Bernice attended Pershing School along with Walter, a couple classes ahead, who played piano accompaniment to the silent movies after school on Fridays. Walter turned out to be West Milwaukee's famed Liberace!

Bernice graduated from West Milwaukee High School in 1940. After high school she attended MATC for more office classes. After a few months she was hired by M&I Bank in their Trust Department.

Joe was a sailor at Great Lakes Naval Base in 1940. While there, he joined others on a trip to Milwaukee for a dance. It was the same day Bernice came home from a not-so-good fishing trip, so she also went to the dance for some fun. They met, danced, talked a lot, and she invited him over for Sunday dinner. Her mom cooked. In 1943 they were married, and Bernice moved with Joe around the country wherever he was based. Once Joe began to serve on the USS New York, Bernice moved back to West Milwaukee.

Bernice was an active little girl who walked and roller skated all over West Milwaukee and Milwaukee and enjoyed playing at Liberty Park (then known as Lapham Park) and ice skating at Pershing School. She especially liked the swings, slides and teeter-totters. But she also loved checking books out of the library after learning to read early. Her first book was her favorite: Black Beauty.

Before her folks had a radio they had a Victrola: *"You put the record on, turn the crank and put the needle down."* It played 78 rpm records. She loved the song "O Genevieve Sweet Genevieve" and that's what she named her doll.

Bernice talks of the old days when coal, ice and milk were all delivered to the home. Many of our Milwaukee bungalows still have the milk chute near the back door. She always knew it was 3:30 a.m. if she heard the clip-clop of Luick's horse who knew every stop for the milk wagon.

Why is she enjoying such longevity? *"I've had a great life. I've never been bored."*

This summer, on Sunday July 17 from 1 to 4 p.m., we're having a birthday party for Bernice on 53rd Street. A small portion of the street will be closed for several hours that afternoon. Everyone in West Milwaukee is welcome to attend.

It is the policy of the Village of West Milwaukee to assure equal opportunity to live in adequate housing facilities regardless of race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, sex, handicap, sexual preference, marital status of persons maintaining a household, lawful source of income, place of birth. or age, and to prohibit discrimination in housing by any persons.

In connection with any real estate transaction which affects any housing accommodation on the open market, or in connection with any public sale, purchase, rental or lease of any accommodation, it is illegal within West Milwaukee for a person, owner, financial institution, real estate broker or sales representative to:

1. Refuse to sell, purchase, rent or lease to a person because of race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, handicap, marital status, sexual preference, sex, age, or place of birth.
2. To discriminate against a person in the terms, conditions or privileges on the sale, purchase, rental or lease of any housing accommodation.

Any person who has a complaint, or who may be aggrieved by any unlawful practice which is prohibited by the Village ordinance (50-30) or State Statute (106.50), may file a complaint after the alleged unlawful practice has occurred. In addition to the local Code of Ordinances, an individual can pursue complaints under both State and Federal Fair Housing Laws. If a person chooses to pursue a complaint through a Federal Administrative Agency, the complaint must be filed with the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) within one year of the last act of discrimination under the 1968 Federal Fair Housing Act (FFHA). To file a Federal Court Action under the FFHA one must file the complaint within two years of the act of discrimination. In addition, under the Civil Rights Act of 1866, which only applies to racial discrimination, a person has up to three years to file a judicial complaint. Additional contact telephone numbers for complaints include the Metropolitan Milwaukee Fair Housing Council (414-278-1240), the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (414-297-3214, Ext. 8300 or 8301), or the State of Wisconsin Equal Rights Division (414-227-4384).

Meet Trustee Jane Edgar



Jane was first elected to the Village Board in 2017 after serving several years on the Village Plan Commission. Jane and her husband, Jim, moved to West Milwaukee in 1992 and purchased their first home in 2000. Son, James, was well served at Pershing Elementary, West Milwaukee Intermediate School and Central High School and Jane was president of the PTA for several years.

"I enjoy living in West Milwaukee because of the casual, friendly atmosphere and number of great neighbors and friends I see on a daily basis," she says. Hers is a particularly active neighborhood with Jane and friends initiating a large 53rd Street garage sale several years ago with over 20 families joining. When 53rd Street was under construction, the neighbors took advantage of the lack of cars to throw a block party with grills, games and a good time right in the middle of the street.

"West Milwaukee is a great community with ready access to all of Milwaukee County and the rest of Wisconsin with such closeness to the interstate and county highways." With West Milwaukee being just 1 square mile, Jane appreciates how many businesses, restaurants, stores and establishments are just around the corner. Jane serves as chairperson of the Health, Housing, Social Services and Recreation Committee of the Village Board (which puts her on the Board of Health); and is also on the Public Works, Recycling and Utilities Committee; and the Licenses, Zoning, Parks and Buildings Committee. She also serves on the new Tourism Commission. Areas of concern for Jane include public safety, health, and education. Jane strives to serve as the female voice, being the only woman currently serving on the Board. She wishes more women would get involved in local politics. There are current openings!

Jane reads a lot, walks outdoors 4 miles every day and enjoys old movies and needlework.

I was first elected to the Village Board in 1993 during a recall election. I was not on the board for a few years but, returned in 2011. I have served at different times on the CDA, Plan Commission and currently Chair the West Milwaukee Tourism Board. I am chair of the Finance Committee, serve on the Public Safety and Personnel Committees, and am also the President pro tem.

I can see the potential the Village has to be a truly unique and special place. Things can change quickly, and we are on the verge of some major changes. I want to be a part of that for the betterment of all the citizens here. To know that I can help make all that a reality is exciting! Some of the biggest issues the Village faces is maintaining the level of services we have, improving our public safety and doing so without raising taxes.

However, I feel the Village can move forward now from a position of strength it did not have in the past and avoid mistakes that were previously made. I think I can be a positive force in making that future by working alongside the other board members and staff.

The West Milwaukee Police Department is pleased to announce the recent graduation of Sergeant Adam Gallenberger from the School of Police Staff and Command (SPSC) at Northwestern University. Sergeant Adam Gallenberger has successfully completed the ten (10) week Staff and Command program held in Pewaukee, Wisconsin from January 24 – April 8, 2022. This program, which was implemented by the Center for Public Safety in 1983, has graduated over 30,000 students both nationally and internationally. Sergeant Adam Gallenberger was a student in SPSC Class #518 which accommodated a total of 34 students for the ten-week period.

The School of Police Staff and Command provides upper-level college instruction in a total of twenty-seven core blocks of instruction and additional optional blocks during each session.

The major topics of study include Leadership, Human Resources, Employee Relations, Organizational Behavior, Applied Statistics, Planning and Policy Development, Budgeting and Resource Allocation.

Each student is academically challenged through written examinations, projects, presentations, and quizzes in addition to a staff study paper that are all required parts of the curriculum. Upon successful completion, students may be awarded a total of 6 units of undergraduate credit from Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois.
